***EASTERN SYNOD CANCELS PUBLIC WORSHIP  
BISHOP MICHAL PRYSE RECOMMENDS A FOUR WEEK SUSPENSION***

In an episcopal message dated January 3, 2022, and forwarded via email to all congregations and pastors, Eastern Synod Bishop Rev. Dr. Michael Pryse addressed the current surge in the transmission of the COVID 19 pandemic’s Omicron variant. “Over the Christmas holidays, we have seen the tightening of restrictions in all four of our provincial jurisdictions,” Bishop Pryse stated. He went on to say, “I feel it is both prudent and responsible for Eastern Synod congregations to suspend all in-person worship and other gatherings effective immediately and for the next four weeks.”

Accordingly, via email communication, our congregational council has agreed to comply with our synod’s recommendation. Our 10:00 a.m. worship services will be limited to a live stream from our website (address above).

Christians know to blame, and fear offers no solution. But love and forgiveness do! You and I are living proof of the power of God’s love and forgiveness to change our attitude, behaviour, and perspective. As people of faith, we trust that the past, present and future are in the hands of God – the source and goal, the beginning and end of life, the Alpha and Omega (the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet) all creation and human destiny.

It is no accident that the transition from one year to the next occurs during the Christmas season. It is no coincidence that it unites New Year’s Day with the naming of the newborn Christ Child. The name “Jesus” promises what his birth reveals – God has come to be with us in the life of our world, to save us from the paralyzing power of fear. Tragödien und Trauma, die wir im neuen Jahr begegnen könnten, bleibt die Versuchung, in Angst zu leben, stark; und damit kommt die Versuchung, anderen die Schuld zu geben – Regierungsbeamte, Krankenhausverwaltungen, Ausländer oder „Impfstoff Gegner“ – einfach irgendjemand.

Christen wissen, dass Schuldzuweisungen und Angst keine Lösung bieten. Aber Liebe und Vergebung tun es! Sie und ich sind der lebende Beweis für die Macht der Liebe und Vergebung Gottes, unsere Einstellung, Haltung und Perspektive zu ändern. Als gläubige Menschen vertrauen wir darauf, dass die Vergangenheit, Gegenwart und Zukunft in Gottes Händen liegen – die Quelle und das Ziel, der Anfang und das Ende des Lebens, das Alpha und Omega (die ersten und letzten Buchstaben des griechischen Alphabets) der gesamten Schöpfung und des menschlichen Schicksals.

Es ist nicht zufällig, dass der Übergang von einem Jahr zum nächsten in der Weihnachtszeit stattfindet. Es ist kein Zufall, dass der Neujahrstag mit der Namensgebung des neugeborenen Christkinds übereinstimmt. Der Name „Jesus“ verspricht, was seine Geburt offenbart – Gott ist im Leben unserer Welt zu uns gekommen, um uns vor der lähmenden Macht der Angst zu bewahren. Es kann kaum ein Zufall sein, dass die Botschaft des Engels Gabriel an die Hirten von Bethlehem „Fürchtet euch nicht“ 365-mal in der Bibel zum Ausdruck kommt – einmal für jeden Tag des Jahres!

Gibt es einen besseren Vorsatz für das neue Jahr, als jeden neuen Tag damit zu beginnen, Gottes Aufruf zu *wiederholen*, der Versuchung zu widerstehen, sich zu fürchten und Gottes Versprechen anzunehmen, die Freude und Kraft zu geben, die die volle und wahre Bedeutung unseres vertrauten saisonbedingten Grußes „Frohe Weihnachten“ widerspiegeln. Egal wie die Umstände sind, Gott ist täglich bei uns, um in Zeiten der Trauer Trost zu bringen, uns Mut zu machen angesichts der Angst, und um der Welt Freude zu bereiten!
