Dear Faithful Friends in Christ,

Martin Luther's famous hymn, *A Mighty Fortress* – a favourite among Lutherans – is based on Psalm 46, which begins, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble."

And Brother Martin certainly had his share of trouble. As a public figure, he was often involved in conflict. As a parish pastor, he was a frequent target of criticism. As a husband, he struggled to balance the responsibilities of a 24/7 church vocation with the responsibilities of marriage and family. As a parent, he grieved the death of two children. As a mortal, he suffered lengthy bouts of depression. As a convicted criminal, he faced the daily possibility of imprisonment and potential execution.

Like Pastor Luther, we too sometimes feel overwhelmed by life's stress and strain. At such times we do well to remember the sound advice offered in Psalm 46's best known verse, "Be still and know that I am God" (Ps. 46:10). In a hectic life that often exhausts us, in a restless world that often frightens us, we give thanks for the psalm's assurance: "The Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our stronghold" (Psalm 46:7, 11).

As the waves of chaos rage in the world around us, or the winds of confusion roar in the world within us, the voice of God's Holy Spirit calls us into holy communion with Jesus Christ. In our weekly discipline of public worship, in our daily discipline of personal devotion, Jesus' voice speaks to calm the tossing sea of anxious hearts and worried minds. In his "real – not just spiritual – presence" of God's word and sacraments, Jesus renews our energy to meet life's many challenges; restores the faith we have lost in the face of life's changes and challenges; and strengthens us to make our own unique contribution to God's salvation of the world.

Rejoice, give thanks and sing! *Pastor Peter* Liebe treue Freunde in Christus,

Martin Luthers berühmte Hymne *Ein feste Burg* – ein Lieblingschoral der Lutheraner – ist basiert auf Psalm 46, der mit "Gott ist unsere Zuflucht und Stärke, eine sehr gegenwärtige Hilfe in Not" beginnt.

Und Bruder Martin hatte sicherlich seinen Anteil an Schwierigkeiten. Als Persönlichkeit des öffentlichen Lebens war er oft in Konflikte verwickelt. Als Pfarrer wurde er häufig kritisiert. Als Ehemann kämpfte er darum, die Verantwortung seiner kirchlichen Berufung mit den Verpflichtungen von Ehe und Familie in Einklang zu bringen. Als Elternteil trauerte er um den Tod zwei seiner Kinder. Als Sterblicher litt er lange an Depressionen. Als verurteilter Verbrecher war er täglich mit der Möglichkeit einer Inhaftierung und möglichen Hinrichtung bedroht.

Wir fühlen uns auch manchmal, wie Pastor Luther, von den Belastungen des Lebens überwältigt. In solchen Zeiten tun wir gut daran, uns an den guten Rat zu erinnern, der im bekanntesten Vers von Psalm 46 gegeben wird: "Seid stille und erkennt, daß ich Gott bin" (Ps 46:11). In einem hektischen Leben, das uns oft erschöpft, in einer unruhigen Welt, die uns oft Angst macht, danken wir für die Zusicherung des Psalms: "Der Herr Zebaoth ist mit uns; der Gott Jakobs ist unser Schutz" (Psalm 46:7, 11).

Während die Wellen des Chaos in der Welt um uns herumtoben oder die Winde der Verwirrung in unserer inneren Welt heulen, ruft uns die Stimme Gottes Heiligen Geistes in die heilige Gemeinschaft mit Jesus Christus. In unserer wöchentlichen Disziplin des öffentlichen Gottesdienstes; in unserer täglichen Disziplin der persönlichen Andacht spricht die Stimme Jesu, um das wogende Meer ängstlicher Herzen und besorgter Gedanken zu beruhigen. In seiner "wirklichen – nicht nur geistlichen – Gegenwart" von Gottes Wort und Sakramenten erneuert Jesus unsere Energie, um die vielen Herausforderungen des Lebens zu meistern; stellt den Glauben wieder her, den wir angesichts der Veränderungen und Herausforderungen des Lebens verloren haben; und stärkt uns, unseren eigenen einzigartigen Beitrag zu Gottes Errettung der Welt zu leisten.

UPHOLDING TRADITION by Pastor Peter Lisinski

It is often said that "In order to know where you are going you have to know where you have been." This familiar "proverb" of our culture reflects the meaning of the word `tradition'. I understand tradition as preserving the best from the past to best provide for the present and best prepare for the future. Upholding tradition was the very inspiration for the Reformation!

The most ancient tradition of all among the followers of Jesus of Nazareth is reflected in his call to mission: "Go and make disciples of all *nations* (not individuals) teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you" (Matthew 28:19-20). The mutual care for those inside the church, and the church's compassion for those outside of our companionship, attracted public attention, and inspired a spiritual movement of social reformation. Conversely, the Christian church today, including our congregation, is declining in membership and influence because our original tradition of communal worship and community outreach has been neutralized by the privatization of faith in self-centered lives.

At this *present* time our congregation stands at the intersection where the *past* COVID 19 pandemic meets the *future* of *global* reformation. As we ponder "where we are going" after COVID, let us remember "where we have been" before COVID. The nations Jesus sends his church to engage now live on our very doorstep! Let us "Go and make disciples" among them by renewing our most ancient tradition of faithful worship of God in Christ-centered lives of self-giving love for our neighbours. We may not reap immediate fruit; we may not even survive as a congregation; but we will have upheld the worthy tradition of faith in Jesus Christ, our only justification, past, present, and future.
